South West Transport Connections – Action Plan





Background

Transport Connections is a Victorian Government place-based initiative to help communities with limited transport options to improve access to services and facilities. Transport Connections supports communities to participate in decision-making to find ways to use existing transport more effectively, and develop innovative solutions to increase access to education, health, employment and social opportunities.

Transport Connections is now in Phase 3 (2010-13) and is focusing on innovative transport solutions such as; better use of community transport and private vehicles (eg. carpooling), active transport, improved information delivery and virtual access (telehealth). Transport Connections has moved away from the conventional public transport options and trying to make better use of existing resources.

As of 1st July 2012, governance and delivery of the South West Transport Connections Project moved to the Southern Grampians Glenelg Primary Care Partnership. This Action Plan is the operating plan for the final year of Phase 3 Transport Connections.

The Transport Connections project is guaranteed funding in the current format through DPCD until end June 2013. SGGPCP needs to grow and adapt its approach to the issues of access and transport disadvantage in a changing funding environment, given that improved access will continue to be a need of our rural community. This means building knowledge, capacity, partnerships and demonstrating achievements to position ourselves to respond to future access needs and opportunities.

The process used to develop this action plan comprised of:

- Collation of local data
- Priority setting of strategic themes through workshop with SGG PCP Executive Committee
- Stakeholder consultation to determine detailed projects
- Finalisation by Executive Committee.

From this process the agreed strategic directions for 2012 / 2013 are:

- **Needs Assessment** Large scale data collection across the catchment to better understand the community's needs with respect to access and transport disadvantage.
- Learning By Doing Using a community development approach to work with a target group to generate a community driven solution to an identified local access issue or concern. This will initially link with the Portland Heywood Needs Analysis and the priority community concerns. The outcomes of the Learning by Doing Model could then provide opportunities for implementation with other communities and cohorts across the region. This process would complement the needs assessment and facilitate some clear outcomes across the catchment.
- **Telehealth** A project known as *Virtually Healthy Making Telehealth Happen* has been funded under the local stream of the Transport Connections Innovation Fund. This project will support health services to establish sustainable telehealth options for our community.
